

# 3rd Grade Unit 1: Interrelationships: Communities and their Environments

## Essential Question #5: In what ways does community and environment shape human culture?

Lesson Title: Legends (Northeast Woodland American Indian

Communities)

SS Standard II, Objective 1, 2

Implementation Time: 60 minutes

Media Resources Needed: Sootface, an Ojibwas Cinderella Story retold by

Robert D. San Souci; Rough Faced Girl by Rafe Martin

Resources Needed: compare/contrast T-Chart; student-created Venn diagram

Materials Needed: colored markers, highlighter pens

#### **Procedure:**

1. Read Sootface and The Rough Faced Girl aloud to the students.

- 2. Review the use of the T-chart and Venn diagram using the overhead to compare and contrast life in the two villages.
- 3. Use the T-chart to list the characteristics of the two Woodlands communities. Encourage students to discuss the similarities and differences in the two stories.
- 4. Highlight similar characteristics between the communities. Transfer the information to the Venn diagram to illustrate the similarities and differences.
- 5. Compare and contrast the Woodlands communities with our own community. Do as a whole class or have students work in pairs or groups. Put information on a T-chart, then transfer to a Venn diagram.



#### **Assessment:**

Discuss similarities and differences of the Woodlands communities and our community as a class. Have students write a 3 sentence paragraph that explains major differences and similarities.

#### **Extension:**

Have students work in pairs or in group to infer whether or not *The Rough Face Girl* is a "Cinderella" story. Allow students time to activate their background knowledge about the "traditional" story (you may want to share an example). Share and discuss as a class when finished.
